CR-05 - Goals and Outcomes

Progress the jurisdiction has made in carrying out its strategic plan and its action plan. 91.520(a)

This could be an overview that includes major initiatives and highlights that were proposed and executed throughout the program year.

The City of Wichita 2018-2019 Fifth Program Year Action Plan allocated federal resources in the amount of \$7,555,620 including a substantial amendment approved December 18, 2018, and a second substantial amendment approved April 2, 2019. Programs and activities identified in the Plan were intended to primarily benefit low- and moderate-income residents of the City of Wichita. Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds in a total amount of \$5,786,369 were designated for public facilities and infrastructure improvements, housing activities, and public services. HOME Investment Partnership(HOME) Funds in the amount of \$1,539,177 were designated to promote homeownership and the development of affordable housing. Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) funds in an amount of \$230,074 were designated for activities to prevent and address homelessness. The December 18, 2018,substantial amendment allocated an additional \$2,675,000 in CDBG funding, re-allocated revolving loan funding, re-programmed funds, projected program income, and Section 108 Loan Repayments for relocation and rehabilitation expenses involved in the Wichita Housing Authority's conversion to the Rental Assistance Program (RAD). The April 2, 2019 substantial amendment involved re-programming of funds from a proposed Acquisition and Development activity and additional Section 108 Loan repayments for an infrastructure improvement project. Planned activities have been executed as planned, or are in the process of execution. Spending has generally occurred as anticipated.

Narrative

During this program year, funds were not allocated based on target areas.

Leveraging

Explain how federal funds leveraged additional resources (private, state and local funds), including a description of how matching requirements were satisfied, as well as how any publicly owned land or property located within the jurisdiction that were used to address the needs identified in the plan.

A variety of funding sources were leveraged by City HOME funds for projects completed during the year and projects currently in progress. Local lenders and agencies provided over \$1,563,450 in first mortgage loans in order to facilitate home purchases assisted through the HOMEownership 80 Program. Local lenders and other organizations also provided over \$1,214,741 in private construction financing in order to leverage HOME-funded single-family construction projects completed during the program year.

The City continued to provide a waiver of building permit fees, and water/sewer tap and plant equity fees for homes constructed with HOME Program funding. These fees were waived in connection with the construction of 22 single-family homes in the designated area.

There was no City-owned property considered to be appropriate or available for the increase of affordable housing stock during the 2018-2019 Program Year.

During the program year, the City's Home Improvement Program continued to experience heavy demand for replacement of high cost infrastructure items, such as water service lines, sewer service lines, HVAC units, and projects involving the rehabilitation of bathrooms for improved accessibility and code compliance. This resulted in a lesser number of low-cost paint grants provided.

As funding levels permit, the City will seek to allocate additional funding to its Home Improvement Program, or adjust goals to allow for higher demand with respect to higher-cost housing infrastructure items.

Narrative Information

HOME figures include down payment and closings costs loans provided for income-eligible, owner-occupant homebuyers. CDBG figures include households assisted with home repair needs.

With respect to the table, "Number of Households to be Supported", data regarding a City of Wichita - Sedgwick County initiative known as "Housing First" is included. The City and the County provide funding for rental and utilities assistance in order to provide a permanent housing solution for chronically homeless individuals. A total of 93 individuals were provided with permanent housing during the program year. The once again funded Homeless Prevention activities, which resulted in the preservation of affordable housing for affected households. Down payment and closing costs assistance loans were provided for 22 households to purchase affordable single-family housing.

Table 12 reflects data from the Wichita Housing Authority's Housing Choice Voucher (HCV) program, HOME Investment Partnerships Program (HOME Program) and the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program. A total of 3111 households were supported through HCV rental assistance activities. The City provided development subsidy funding through the HOME Program, in order to produce 18 new units of single-family housing for affordable homeownership opportunities. A total of 22 households received down payment and closing costs assistance loans in order to purchase these homes, as well as four additional homes constructed by a local non-profit housing developer.

The City once again utilized CDBG funding to provide zero-interest deferred payment loans for home repair assistance for low-to-moderate income households. The program assists households in preserving affordable homeownership. A total of 179 households received assistance loans through the program.

CR-25 - Homeless and Other Special Needs 91.220(d, e); 91.320(d, e); 91.520(c)

Evaluate the jurisdiction's progress in meeting its specific objectives for reducing and ending homelessness through:

Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

The City of Wichita provides Emergency Shelter Grant (ESG) funding for the United Methodist Open Door Resource and Referral Center, a day shelter where homeless individuals and families can receive an array of services including lunch, laundry and shower facilities, mail services, etc. Additionally, staff at the Center provide assessment and referral services for medical assistance, counseling, legal services and veterans' services, many of which are available on site, as well as referrals and assistance obtaining permanent housing.

The City of Wichita Police Department's Homeless Outreach Team (HOT) continues to engage unsheltered homeless persons, and makes referrals to the City's Housing First and Rapid Rehousing programs. Other organizations that conduct street outreach include: COMCARE of Sedgwick County, Inter-Faith Ministries, Wichita Children's Home, and the Veteran's Administration

Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

The Wichita Sedgwick County Continuum of Care (CoC) continues to monitor and update records relative to the emergency and transitional housing needs of homeless persons. During the 2018-2019 program year, the City of Wichita provided funding to seven organizations to assist with emergency shelter needs for the homeless. A total of 4,931 persons were served by these organizations.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: likely to become homeless after being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); and, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs

The City of Wichita's Housing First Program is the primary vehicle through which chronically homeless persons make the transition to permanent housing. The program receives referrals from community agencies, the VA Medical Center, and the Wichita Police Department's Homeless Outreach team. The referring agency provides weekly case management services for clients who receive housing through the program. CDBG funds are used to pay for Housing First staff, while the City of Wichita and Sedgwick County provide an additional \$382,736 for client housing and utility costs. During this program year, 93 persons received permanent housing through Housing First.

The City of Wichita also partners with the VA Medical Center to place eligible veterans in Wichita Housing Authority programs. VA Staff continue to provide supportive services after clients are placed in public housing or are receiving Housing Choice Vouchers.

Other community resources contributing to this effort are the Wichita Family Crisis Center (formerly YWCA) and Catholic Charities Harbor House, programs providing emergency shelter to victims of domestic violence. Both programs received both ESG and CDBG funding during the program year.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

The City partners with Center of Hope, and Salvation Army, community agencies that provide rent and utility assistance to low-income persons who are facing eviction. The City provides an allocation of ESG funding, and the agency determines eligibility and provides other client services including budget counseling.

The Wichita Children's Home and Miracles, Inc. provide assistance to youth who are in crisis related to housing needs.

CR-30 - Public Housing 91.220(h); 91.320(j)

Actions taken to address the needs of public housing

One of the City of Wichita Housing Authority's (WHA) largest needs is to substantially improve the quality of its public housing units. For years the WHA staff have used its Capital Fund Program to modernize units a few at a time. During the 2018-19 Program Year, the WHA moved closer to converting all 578 units of its Public Housing units to the Rental Assistance Demonstration (RAD) Pilot Program. Project developer Key Enterprises developed rehabilitation plans for the two high rise buildings, the two garden apartment sites and the 352 scattered site single family dwellings. Section 3 businesses, minority contractors and large contractors were recruited. The 2018 Capital Fund Program grant was budgeted for RAD unit rehabilitation and temporary tenant relocation once conversion is completed.

Actions taken to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in management and participate in homeownership

The WHA staff always review proposed policy changes with public housing residents before presenting to the Wichita Housing Authority Board for approval. Staff keep Public Housing tenants informed by meeting with them periodically and sending written updates to them with the monthly rent statements. In the last five years, the Family Self Sufficiency program has grown to include 180 WHA families. Thirty-two families graduated and two families became first-time homebuyers.

Actions taken to provide assistance to troubled PHAs

The Wichita Housing Authority in not, nor ever has been a troubled PHA.

CR-35 - Other Actions 91.220(j)-(k); 91.320(i)-(j)

Actions taken to remove or ameliorate the negative effects of public policies that serve as barriers to affordable housing such as land use controls, tax policies affecting land, zoning ordinances, building codes, fees and charges, growth limitations, and policies affecting the return on residential investment. 91.220 (j); 91.320 (i)

During the 2016-17 program year, the Wichita City Council adopted the Comprehensive Housing Policy developed by the Housing and Community Services Department. The policy is divided into the four areas of housing affordability, housing availability, neighborhood stability and resources. Each policy area includes an array of strategies which were developed in conjunction with the Wichita Area Metropolitan Planning Department and determined to be consistent with both the Five Year Consolidated Plan and the City of Wichita Comprehensive Plan. Strategies for implementation are under development. During the 2018-19 program year, staff continued to explore the development and establishment of a land bank. The City continues to waive building permit fees for affordable infill housing units that are developed under agreements with various HOME-funded partners and other builders.

The Kansas Housing Resources Corporation implemented a policy change to longer require a resolution of support from the local governing body for affordable housing developers submitting applications for Low-Income Housing Tax Credit (LIHTC) financing. Affordable housing developers are no longer required to make presentations to local District Advisory Boards, and are no longer required to notify property owners within 200 feet of a proposed LIHTC-financed affordable housing development.

Actions taken to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City of Wichita is considering several strategies on a small scale, to develop more affordable housing and eliminate neighborhood blight. Research and review of initiatives involving the acquisition of tax-foreclosed vacant property and coordination with nonprofit housing developers to create new affordable housing continued.

The City continues to work with housing developers receiving HOME funds to provide additional funding when serving persons with disabilities, to allow for modifications such as at-grade entrances, stair glides, and bathrooms and kitchens with accessibility features. The Home Improvement Program continues to assist homeowners in need of accessibility improvements to their homes. These improvements involve remodeling of bathrooms to provide for roll-in or walk-in showers, grab bars, and increased room for wheel chair accessibility. Funding can also be provided for wheel chair ramps.

Actions taken to reduce lead-based paint hazards. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

During the program year, Housing and Community Services Department staff successfully applied for a grant through HUD's Office of Lead Hazard Control and Healthy Homes to assist low-income homeowners with grants and forgivable loans to remediate lead paint hazards. Grant funding in the amount of \$1,667,173 plus local matching funds in the amount of \$166,718 will be utilized to address lead-based paint hazards in at least 110 residential housing units within the City of Wichita, beginning with the 2019-2020 Program Year.

CDBG-funded housing improvement/repair projects are undertaken in compliance with federal and state lead-based paint regulations.

Actions taken to reduce the number of poverty-level families. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City of Wichita continued to implement several strategies as an entity, and in partnership with other agencies in the community, to address income obstacles through job training and placement, asset building and financial education, and specialized assistance to persons applying for social security benefits and other government resources. The City of Wichita is designated as Community Action Agency for Sedgwick County and receives Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) funding to address poverty issues at the community level. The Wichita Sedgwick County Community Action Partnership (WSCCAP), a division of the Housing and Community Services Department, administers several programs to assist individuals and families to overcome the challenges of poverty. During the program year, a total of 1940 individuals received medical assistance with WSCCAP funding, 316 individuals and/or families received family development services, and eight families participated in financial literacy and savings match programs.

Actions taken to develop institutional structure. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City of Wichita is a member of West Wichita Promise Neighborhood which is a coalition of public and private agencies committed to provide support for children from 'cradle to career' in the Wichita West High School feeder system. The past work continues to build good results. During the 2018-2019 program year WWPN elementary schools had lower absenteeism. The United Way of the Plains is the lead agency and others organizations include USD 259, the City of Wichita, Child Start, Project Access, GraceMed Clinic, Connecting Point, Kansas Children's Service League, Wichita State University, Newman University, The Pando Initiative, Catholic Charities, Senior Services, the Delano Neighborhood Association, and Sunflower Neighborhood and Business Association. UWP has also developed school readiness and grade-level reading initiatives in WWPN/Wichita including Dolly Parton Imagination Library which provides a free book for all children aged 0 – 5 years (as of 9/2017 serving 8,853 Wichita children) and Read to Succeed (R2S) in which over 400 volunteer reading coaches are matched with at-risk third grade students in targeted elementary schools in USD 259 to provide weekly intervention tactics.

The WHA contracts with Central Plains Area Agency (CPAAA) on the HUD funded ROSS-Service Coordinator (SC) grant. CPAAA provides the service coordinator and other agencies including the Independent Living Resource Center, Senior Services, Inc., Sedgwick County COMCARE, Sedgwick County In-Home Services, Wichita Fire and Police departments, GraceMed, Hunter Health Clinic, and the Mental Health Association provide supportive services and in-kind matching funds. The ROSS-SC grant will end December 31, 2019.

Actions taken to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The WHA/Central Plains Area Agency on Aging working relationship provides a good model for social service delivery for senior public housing tenants. During this program year the WHA developed a coordinated relationship with the Wichita Police Department. The two agencies shared information that would help keep vulnerable tenants safer and help keep neighborhoods safer too. This relationship will continue and be used as a model in other public housing authorities across the nation.

Identify actions taken to overcome the effects of any impediments identified in the jurisdictions analysis of impediments to fair housing choice. 91.520(a)

Housing Choice-Employment-Action: Stable income is key to better housing. The Wichita-Sedgwick County Community Action Partnership provided job coaching to 316 people, job training to 32 persons and placed 68 individuals in jobs.

Housing Choice-Housing Conditions-Action: The City continued to provide resources for low-income homeowners to repair their homes. Generally these are minor home repairs that create ADA accessibility, and or systems repairs including roofs, furnaces, and water heaters.

Transit Dependent Housing Choices – Action: The City's leadership on the Wichita Area Metropolitan Planning Organization is identifying strategies to pursue and close the community's local and regional gaps, through implementation of the Metropolitan Transportation Plan 2040. Wichita Transit (WT) is moving from a hub and spoke route system to a grid system. This will provide much better transportation to persons who use the bus. WT staff help people learn how to ride the bus and navigate the route system.

The City of Wichita monitors all CDBG, ESG, and HOME-funded activities. Expenditures and accomplishments are reviewed and documented monthly to assure eligibility, compliance, and performance. Actual expenses and outcomes are compared to anticipated targets to ensure both timeliness of spending and achievement of anticipated goals. Progress for all activities is monitored on an ongoing basis. Onsite monitoring is conducted for selected activities. Year-end accomplishment reports are compiled for all funded activities. All stakeholders, including funded providers, are invited to public meetings and hearings during the program year to provide input into the planning and funding process.

HOME-assisted rental housing developments subject to a long-term affordability restrictions are monitored in accordance with the applicable regulations.

Fair Housing regulations and requirements are made a part of funding agreements entered into with Community Housing Development Organizations and other non-profit and for-profit housing developers, when provideing HOME funds for housing development activities. When monitoring HOME-funded rental housing projects subject to long-term affordability requirements, staff review leasing documents and tenant selection procedures to ensure compliance with Fair Housing requirements.

The 2018-19 Consolidated Annual Performance Report (CAPER) is being made available for public comment during the period from August 30 through September 13, 2019. Hard copies were made available at Wichita City Hall, Housing and Community Services Department, all Neighborhood Resource Centers, and selected branch libraries, as well as online at the City Website. Comments were solicited and were accepted via writing, email, and in person at a public hearing during the Wichita City Council meeting on September 17. The public hearing was advertised in the newspaper on August 30, 2019, and again on September 10, 2019.

The activities implemented during the current program year continue to reflect the objectives identified in the City of Wichita's 2014-2018 Consolidated Plan. A substantial amendment to the action plan was approved in November, 2017, following citizen participation. The amendment included funding for a capital project for a public facility, the historic Dunbar Theatre. The allocation of additional funding further promoted the goal of neighborhood stabilization, as identified in both the Consolidated Plan and the 2017-2018 Program Year Action Plan.

The City has established minimum Affirmative Marketing requirements for HOME-assisted rental and homebuyer projects. These requirements are incorporated into all funding agreements when the project involves five or more HOME-assisted units.

Recipients of HOME funds for projects requiring compliance with affirmative marketing regulations are contractually required to prepare a written Affirmative Marketing Plan for respective projects, when

applicable. The Affirmative Marketing Plan must be available for public inspection in the recipient organization's office. Each plan must contain specific steps/actions that the recipient organization will take to provide information and otherwise attract eligible persons of all racial, ethnic, and gender groups in the applicable housing marketing area for the specific housing project.

Housing developers accessing HOME funding provide information regarding proposed projects in community newspapers, the Wichita Eagle, and through local radio stations. One Community Housing Development Organization is affiliated with Neighborworks, and provides homeownership training classes. HOME-funded developers share in the affirmative marketing responsibilities for the City's homebuyer program, as part of these efforts.

A total of \$40,349 in additional funding was allocated for HOME-assisted projects to be undertaken with 2018-2019 Program Year funding, as a result of program income received. This additional funding will be used for two additional down payment assistance loans provided in connection with the purchase of single-family homes developed by Community Housing Development Organizations, other non-profit housing development organizations and for-profit developers accessing City HOME funds for the development of affordable single-family homes. Income-eligible, owner-occupant homebuyers received these down payment assistance loans. A total of \$59,950 was allocated for the construction of a single-family housing unit through the Housing Development Loan Program, which provided housing for a low-to-moderate income, owner-occupant homebuyer.

Describe other actions taken to foster and maintain affordable housing. 91.220(k) (STATES ONLY: Including the coordination of LIHTC with the development of affordable housing). 91.320(j)

The City's Home Repair program provides forgivable, deferred payment loans to extremely low, low and moderate income owner-occupant homeowners in order to repair or replace expensive infrastructure items, as a means to preserve homeowner affordability. Funded projects include remodeling of bathrooms in order to provide increased accessibility, as part of an effort to allow elderly homeowners the opportunity to "age in place". The City continues to waive building permit fees for HOME-funded, infill housing construction. Homes are sold to HOME-eligible owner-occupant homebuyers.
